Suggestions for Teachers and Students

- 1. Length of Recital: The coordinator will make sure the recital does not last over 50 minutes. Please include the performance length in your email.
- 2. Preparation: Pieces must be well-prepared and polished.
- 3. Stage Presence: Students should acknowledge applause with a bow.
- 4. Cameras: No pictures should be taken during a performance. There will be a time set before and after for taking pictures.
- 5. Arrival time: Please remind parents to bring students 15 minutes early so the recitals can begin on time. Also, please tell parents and students if they are detained to please wait until a performer finishes before entering the room.
- 6. Good listeners: This is a good opportunity for students to learn to be good, respectful listeners. Students should sit still and listen quietly.
- 7. Encourage others: Ask your students to encourage other performers.
- 8. Recital dress: Please ask your students to dress appropriately for the occasions.
